

The Hurtig Lecture on the Future of Canada

The Hurtig Annual Lecture on the Future of Canada was launched by the Department of Political Science in the Faculty of Arts in 2005 to mark Alberta's Centennial Year and to honour an outstanding Edmontonian and Canadian citizen.


The primary goal of the Hurtig Lecture series is to cultivate a national platform at the University of Alberta for leading opinion leaders to deliver lectures that provoke, educate, and generate a more inclusive understanding of our collective experiences and responsibilities as engaged citizens in an ever-more interdependent and complex world.

Mr. Hurtig provides a sterling example of engaged Canadian citizenship. With vision and determination, this entrepreneur and publisher crafted

a lasting contribution to our national heritage and culture – The Canadian Encyclopaedia, first published in 1985. As an author of many best-selling books, he has invited Canadians to reflect upon fundamental values that shape our daily lives and our collective future.

Mr. Hurtig's distinguished contributions to national life have been celebrated with many accolades, not the least, the award of an Order of Canada and six honorary doctorates from leading Canadian universities, including the University of Alberta. The Department of Political Science and the Faculty of Arts Development Office are currently fund-raising to establish an endowed Hurtig Chair in Engaged Citizenship at the University of Alberta.

Peil Macdonald, a nineteen year veteran of CBC Television News, has been *The National's* Washington correspondent since 2003. He began his distinguished career in journalism the old fashioned way as a copyboy for the *Ottawa Citizen*. In those early years, when he wasn't fetching coffee for editors, he covered local council meetings and police stories.

Within a few years, he moved to Parliament Hill, writing for Southam Newspapers. In 1988, after a decade of reporting for three newspapers – the Ottawa Citizen, the Montreal Gazette and the Vancouver Sun, he turned to television and the CBC News. In CBC's parliamentary bureau, he covered national elections, referendums, and all the cracks and pressures of binational federalism.

In 1998, Neil Macdonald was transferred to Jerusalem, where he spent five years reporting on the Middle East. He worked in most Arab countries and covered the violent uprising known as the second intifada.
